REGULAR MEETING WARREN CITY COUNCIL

MAY 26, 2010

- CALL TO ORDER** The regular meeting of Warren City Council was called to order by President of Council Robert A. Marchese in Warren City Council Chambers at 7:30 PM, 141 South St. SE, Warren, Ohio.
- INVOCATION/PLEDGE** Helen Rucker, Councilman at Large, opened the meeting with prayer followed by the Pledge of Allegiance.

- MRS. RUCKER: Mr. President, I'd like to make a motion for a moment of silence for Captain Gilmore's mother, Mrs. Lillie Brooks, Nick Pitini and all our veteran's who served.

- MRS. RUCKER: Thank you.
- MOTION-ACCEPT PREVIOUS MINUTES** Motion Rucker, second Novak to accept the minutes of the last meeting but dispense with reading of the same. VIVA VOCE: Yes; 0 No. Motion passed.

REPORTS

MAYOR MAYOR O'BRIEN: Thank you very much Mr. President, Members of Council: I just have one brief report. If council has not received a copy of this and I was looking to see if they have not I wanted to report that the Warren Police Department did a high visibility traffic enforcement process May 19th, May 22nd and a total of 28 hours were used by the Warren Police Department and this is a grant for additional traffic enforcement approved by the work plan submitted by the Ohio Traffic office. I'm here to say that the results of the blitz were: 2 of the IRS; 50 citations for speed; 11 citations for seat belt; 6 arrests for driving under suspension; other citations albeit duress; 1 capias and 1 warrant. Again, this is the a grant used by the Ohio Traffic Safety office and it was the use of those grants and working in traffic areas on Elm Road just like always we have people that are complaining about lack of traffic enforcement. It just so happens some of the complainers were picked up for speeding; those very same complainers. So not that people shouldn't continue to complain but the complainers should be also abiding by the law also.

I want to thank Councilwoman Rucker for mentioning those who have passed and again to Mrs. Gilmore, mother of Captain Janice Gilmore and the wife of former police officer, long time police officer Larry Gilmore, a tragic accident. Lillie Brooks, miss Brooks on 2nd Street; her husband passed some 25 years ago, a prominent member of the Trumbull County/Warren community, Zip Brooks, Fred 'Zip' Brooks, members like, old-time members like Al Novak and of course Dan Sferra who used to appoint Zip Brooks to committees and Dan Sferra, I would

suspect, I think was the Mayor when appointed Lillie Brooks to the Health Board. Lillie Brooks was the longest serving members of the Warren City Board of Health, 25 years and she obviously will be missed. And the funeral, calling hours are tonight and the funeral will be tomorrow, 11 o'clock at Grace AME Church.

Also the and believe it or not, time has flown by, the 25th annual African-American Festival will be June 4th, 5th, and 6th in downtown Courthouse Square from 11 AM to 11 PM. It's, it's a very well attended festival. I can't believe Bob it's been 25 years and they have everything from singing from gospel, church gospel choirs to different talent shows, youth activities; it's very well attended; June 4th, 5th, and 6th in the Courthouse Square.

Also as everyone probably realizes banners across Market Street to banners in the downtown Courthouse Square to banners all over the amphitheater, the first River Rock at the Amp Saturday thanks to two local entrepreneurs, Ken Haidaris and Marty Cohen. We have a exciting summer planned and thanks to dozens upon dozens of sponsors, local sponsors to make this concert series what it is. So the first River Rock at the Amp is going to be this Saturday night and again I want to thank the Operations Department and the Engineering Department for working so closely with Mr. Haidaris and Mr. Marty Cohen. Thank you.

LAW DIRECTOR

MR. HICKS: Which one of those was the one short report? No report, thank you.

AUDITOR

MR. GRIFFING: Thank you Mr. President. I'd just to make Council aware that at the next meeting will be a resolution accepting and adopting the tax budget, the first step in the annual process of preparing the budget for 2011. Thank you Mr. President.

TREASURER

MR. HOMLITAS: Thank you Mr. President. No report this evening.

DEPARTMENT HEAD REPORTS

POLICE

CHIEF BOWERS: Thank you Mr. President. I'd just like everybody to know that yesterday we installed a twenty thousand dollar worth of equipment in one of our cruisers. It's a automatic license plate reader. This device is capable, in fact we tested it, we ran over 800 plates in less than an hour. It's two cameras mounted on a car. You'll probably see it; it's on care 64. They're outside on the trunk, but it will actually read the plate to see if it's wanted for anything rather the driver or the owner of the vehicle has a driver's license, we can instantaneously put in a license plate number. If someone pulls an armed robbery, we get a license number, it's put in that unit and we got this free of charge under another grant program. We have it for a year, after that of course, the catch is there is a maintenance fee next year. I just wanted to share that. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: Thank you Chief. Thank you for the guidance on that.

STANDING COMMITTEE REPORTS

STRATEGIC PLANNING

MR. DEAN: Thank you Mr. President. No report, but the Strategic Planning Group did meet for their first organizational meeting. They have a second meeting scheduled for June 14th which will be their first formal meeting and that's under the chairmanship of John Robertson.

COMMUNITY

MRS. RUCKER: Thank you Mr. President. The Community Development Committee met Monday and we just finished our discussion on the Western Reserve building. The report is on file with the clerk if anybody wants to see it.

PUBLIC UTILITES

MR. BROWN: Thank you Mr. President. I'd like to call a meeting of the Public Utilities Committee next Wednesday, June 2, 7 PM in the Council Chambers. This is regarding a presentation by an organization Repower America. They want to repower American with clean

electricity, energy efficiency and renewable clean energy. They'd like to diversify our energy sources and try and jump start our economy. Help our dependence on foreign oil and if you'd like some more information on this prior to the meeting go to www.repowerameric.org. Sheila Klasovsky will be the presenter of that and possibly a member or two from Youngstown coming up from their Council and some various other people. It should be interesting. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: They'll be a lot of help.

FINANCE

MR. NOVAK: Thank you Mr. President. The Finance Committee met yesterday and reviewed the agenda for this evening's meeting. There were no recommendations made for the three drafts that are on the agenda for this evening. I had hoped that Mr. Angelo would be here this evening to bring us copies of the two reports he had on the revenue and also the, how the rate study was going to be implemented and how long it was going to take. I will call him in the morning and ask him to please send up some of those copies so that we have them cause we had to share copies yesterday in the meeting. There only two copies of each of those. Thank you Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: Mayor, did you want to add to that?

MAYOR O'BRIEN: Mr. Novak that meeting with Mr. Angelo for all intensive purposes, he was on his way to the meeting tonight. Something must have happened between home and here or wherever he was at before here. So I apologize for that, but I'll find out tomorrow morning if not I'll find out tonight, but pass it on tomorrow. Thank you.

EDUCATION

MISS SAFFOLD: Thank you Mr. Chairman. There was a meeting held at the Mocha House on May 22nd between City Council and the Board of Education and I would like to thank those members of the Council who were in attendance: Miss Rucker, Miss Morn, Mr. Dippolito, Mr. Novak, Mr. Colbert and Mr. Marchese. The entire Board of Education was in attendance as well as the Superintendent Miss Helwig. Some of the highlights of that meeting included President Marchese suggesting that council and the Board of Education initiate a Lights On after school program and that a replacement for Mr. Klingeman be appointed as a liason between Council and the Board of Education. I personally suggested that the city and the Board of Education collaborate on a summer playground program similar to the one that we had in the 70's.

Mr. Bellino, a member of the Board of Education, indicated that he and Mrs. Limperos had discussed with the Mayor that they were interested in a land swap meaning that they would be willing to give the City of Warren, Warren Western Reserve, the property as well as the property of Alden Elementary in return for three lots from Willard School and three lots that abut Jefferson School. And that's pretty much what happened at the meeting. Thank you.

PUBLIC SPEAKING

BARBARA LOOMIS, 1044 HARRISON NE, WARREN, OHIO: My name's Barbara Loomis. I've lived in Warren for 35 years. The last time I spoke here was probably a little over a month ago and since then in our area we've had the double homicide. We've had over five thousand dollars worth of damage done to cars in the parking lot of a business in our area and I'd like to emphasize where I live is maybe an eight block square from Woodland to St. Cyril and Laird to Logan, so it's a very small area. Probably count the domestic disputes, juveniles. Last time I met with yourself and the Mayor and the Police Chief and I will say Michael's been involved well I will say that today I was able to get a name and an address of one of the charming young women and they range in age from 16 to 10. They're up and down the streets, neighbor after neighbor after neighbor, just horrid, filthy mouth for no reason and you don't need to approach them, cause they'll approach you. And this is just the beginning of summer, school isn't even out yet. So I imagine that things are only going to get worse. There was some responses from police and I understand you're short and you know that disturbances are low on the priority list and I understand that, but there's going to be a

problem that's going to arise and there is going to be probably someone hurt because of it. An incident this afternoon probably about 5:30 fourteen neighbors on four streets, two streets were out in their yard, you see how many got, I coned my husband in to coming, but other than that you keep, I can't get cooperation for a neighborhood watch. I can't get help. So I appreciate your listening; I appreciate your diligence and Officer Bowers with his, but like I said it's young kids and it's, if they're not stopped now, they will be the next ones in a double homicide. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: Miss Loomis, did you find helpful last time we sat down as a group? The few of us, was that helpful to you?

MRS. LOOMIS: It didn't hurt.

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: Would you like to do that again this evening? I think that would be a good starting point.

MRS. LOOMIS: (inaudible)

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: Okay. Well, hum, we, we will meet after the meeting is you're willing to stay and I'll ask the Police and Fire Chairman to come to that meeting as well as Miss Morn and Mr. Flask and Chief if you're free to come by. The Mayor had already told me he wanted to join us. Thank you Miss Loomis.

Our next speaker is Larry Dueber. In fact Mr. Dueber, come to the meeting she's having trouble getting a neighborhood block watch started. You will help us with that.

LARRY DUEBER, 1747 ESTABROOK NW, WARREN, OHIO: I've know Barbara for a number of years and I know she's had a small group and it's hard to build up. I realize that. Larry Dueber, 1747 Eastabrook, northwest side of Warren. Spoke last meeting on the charter issue. I'm going to speak again on it. I commend Councilman Novak and Dippolito for sponsoring this legislation. I don't think it's an accident that close to 75% of the cities in the State of Ohio have charter government, many villages do. We have a lot in our area, in this region that have gone to the charter and one of the things that's central to the new comprehensive plan that this city has adopted is the issue of change. Not just change for the sake of change, concrete change. Change that is going to promote positive things for the community, and I think we're at that place now. A lot of good things happen; we have a lot of negative things happen. When you have that you start to question. You start to look at new ideas, new ways of doing things and I think this is the time. This is a perfect time to do it. I realize there are reservations on some of your parts; Council to accept this. I would like you to think of something, this was put to me and I want to pass it along. You can be opposed to something, but don't be opposed to the point where you create a barrier that's going to block the opportunity for the citizens to be able to look at it, to consider it. If you put it on the ballot and enable those people who want to serve on the charter commission who want to run for that position to get their petitions out and then attend public meetings if you so desire and you can speak against it and give your reasons for that. But don't block it by not approving this ordinance when it gets to that point and I know you are going in to first reading. Give the citizens of Warren the opportunity to look at it. Is it perfect? No. No such animal exists. I don't care what government you're talking about whether local, state or federal, there are problems in all levels. But we're looking for ways to do things differently and one other things; one other advantage I think we gain from this is it's going to engage more citizens. We have a lot of people who don't pay much attention to what's going on. I think we're seeing it with the neighborhood groups stepping up, other organizations stepping up. I think you would get more citizens who would participate in government this way; who would run for the charter commission, who will offer ideas for improvements if the charter is in place because it can yearly be looked at and changes made. You'll get more people to participate that way; take an interest in it. I ask you to look at this. I know there will be committee meetings on it. People will have the opportunity to speak. Someone will come to neighborhood meetings. You've already talked about it back there and we welcome that. But don't block, let the people actually have the opportunity to look at it closely. Put it on the ballot and give the citizens of Warren that opportunity. Thank you Mr. President.

MISCELLANEOUS 7:55 PM

MRS. RUCKER No comments other than to ask Council Members if anyone who is not on e-mail, everybody's on? Thank you.

MR. DEAN Thank you Mr. President. A few years back, I think there are only a few of us that were here when we had the privilege of watching a young man who's name was Paul Warfield and all we ever heard about him was that he was bound for the NFL or he was bound for the American League and was going to end up in the Hall of Fame. We thought that that was one of a kind and then along came a young kid whose name was Lloyd McCoy. At 11 years old on the east side, that's all they talked about. A kid named Bones, absolute talent. The adults would try to strike him out; they'd throw sliders at him and laugh at him when he realized how to pick up the seam of the ball coming at him; couldn't do anything with him; they just respected him like that kid. On April 13th someone who was never, ever going to achieve anything near what Lloyd McCoy Jr. achieve in 11 years picked up an AK-47 and fired 25 rounds in to an address on Wood Street. An AK-47, one round struck Lloyd in the back, 6 days later he died. That was not the end of the life and legend of Lloyd McCoy. There is a building that was dedicated last week and just as important I think were the 38 kids who at the end of the school year would go out to a ball field and play football, flag football with each other and they played seriously. Lloyd McCoy always scored more touchdowns than anybody else and always got the most valuable player and this year those kids were planning to play that game and they always did, it was important to them. People had donated jerseys with the number 86 and the Lloyd McCoy Bowl on the back of the jersey and Dick's donated some footballs. The word got out that there was some kind of organized game going on on Niles Road and that game couldn't take place there. And up to the plate stepped Bob Faulkner and Katherine Hellwig and said we will make arrangements for you all to play that game in Harding Stadium.

Now I want to thank Doug Franklin who flipped every yard, every down marker to Marty Gargas, Chief, who held one 10 yard chain to Bob Faulkner who held the other for 5 games on Sunday. Now this doesn't seem much to most of us here, but to those 38 kids who could only dream some day of playing football in Mollenkopf Stadium, they had the time of their lives. And for those of you where something happened when you were 10 or 11 years old that changed your life, these kids, 38 of them on this Sunday will never forget and to everybody who had a part in that I'm absolutely grateful and thanking you all. Thank you Mr. President.

MR. NOVAK Thank you Mr. President. First I'd like to comment on the issue that our Chief of Police Bowers is basically begging for more officer, bring officers back. I had a, an incident right before I was coming down here to the meeting, getting ready, my father I guess in a not thinking moment at 88, answered the front door and opened the door. And this young gentleman was there and he says oh, I see you have a Howland Alarm System in your house. And basically what he was there was to sell me a new alarm system and he said you see how bad the City of Warren is, how much crime there is. The first thing I asked him was

are you registered to be out as a sales person in the City of Warren which he pulled his registration out, so I will commend him for that, but I explained to him we just had a lightning strike up further at the end of my street and it took my system out and I just replaced the whole system for 276 dollars. I think this is something that unfortunately some people use this negative bad news as a drive to make a profit for themselves, but I think it also tells us that you know we have problems here. The stabbing that took place over at 506 Hall Avenue, those two individuals were living over on Belmont NE when that neighborhood group had their rally and we were all over there attending. They were having the same problems over there on Hall Avenue and that was selling drugs and running prostitutes in and out of the house and only God knows what in there. And now we see what it's come to; two people were stabbed and we have another neighborhood that's in fear of what's next. So I would hope that we can look and see anywhere if we have available funds. If we can keep asking for the federal marshals, the state marshals patrol, highway patrol, anyone that we can ask for help because I'm afraid we're going to have a very, very hot bad summer. I would hope that we can get that help. It's direly need. So I don't know what we have going on, but again I cautioned my father and I asked him, please don't answer the door because I don't know who this could have been. It could have been somebody sticking a gun in our face and it can happen anywhere.

Also too, I would like to remind everybody that the 31st will be the 25th anniversary of when the tornado went through our area here and we had quite a few people lost their lives and I would hope that we can remember those folks and that everyone please don't forget to be at the ceremony starting at 9:30 on the bridge when the wreath is placed upon the waters of the Mahoning River and also the memorial service that will take place at the amphitheater because I constantly go to these events and it seems like we have less and less people that come there. And we cannot forget, we must honor those folks especially those that are no longer with us. Thank you Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: Thank you Mr. Novak. By way of what you were talking of before regarding the constant struggle of more and more funding, I've been reaching out and I don't have this complete yet, but I'd like to set up this summer at their convenience, they're obviously more busy than we are, Congressman Ryan, State Representative Letson and State Senator Cafaro in the same room. And the squeaky wheels squeal in 2010 gets the grease and I think one of the things we have to do is quit being so humble and just say what we feel. We need some help, so hopefully as that process nears some date that I can give you, hopefully we can sit down with all of them and Council can discuss some options particularly and in light of what Miss Loomis says, increased crime and things of that nature.

That's in the works, we don't have anything definite yet, but we intend to do that this summer.

MR. BROWN

Thank you Mr. President. On Monday we had a clean-up/blight meeting across from the old Harding gymnasium and we had at least 50 citizens show up for that meeting. It was really encouraging. I just want to thank Marly from the Tribune for putting the article in. It helped a lot of those people know about the meeting. I'd like to thank the Mayor and the Director, Sgt. O'Grady, Mr. Pinti, Mr. Keys, Commissioner Fuda and just happy to report that one of the first things from that meeting, that overgrown home was cleaned up today by prisoners under the direction of Chief Guarino from the county. So thank you to everyone and we're going to keep pounding away up there and try and stop the blight from going any further.

MRS. SAFFOLD

Thank you Mr. President. I would like to thank the City of Warren administration for their willingness to assist the westside with emergency and when I say emergency, I mean emergency grass cutting

efforts this week, in particular the fire station on Palmyra Road. The grass is knee high and the grass is almost waist high in the Westlawn area. I rode by there today, so I thank you very much for your willingness to assist us.

Also there are several corner lots with grass so high it's impossible to see oncoming traffic. So we look forward to getting those areas cut as well. Thank you.

MR. COLBERT

Thank you Mr. President. Just a couple things real quick. I wanted to thank the Northwest Neighborhood Association for a project they did over in the 7th Ward on McMyler Street; took care of a nuisance of a house as well as the bushes that have been a safety hazard for a while and also a ridiculous blight out there, ridiculous blight in the city for awhile and I want to thank them for taking care of that project. And I also thank Marly for bringing the attention to the groups efforts by putting it in the paper.

About three weeks ago up in the Austin Village Apartments, a Pepsi vendor came to fix a machine and was attacked by a group of kids. Three weeks later roughly on Linda Drive in my ward a gentleman pulled in to his driveway to two youths asking him to mow his lawn in the rain and once he told those individuals 'no' he would take care of his own law, they assaulted him and robbed him. I went and I visited this gentleman. This is bad. They did a number on this guy. And I remembered from Miss Loomis came before and spoke to us about the juveniles in her neighborhood that were causing havoc and I think that's (inaudible) groups of juveniles that were congregating, 30, 40, 50 individuals on a street corner (inaudible) Commerce and nine times out of ten they would be disbursed by gunfire. We acknowledge in our individual conversations that one of our, one of our main sources of crime in the city is becoming our youth. And we can sit back and let this happen and throw them to the legal system; let them sort it out or we can try to come together as leaders of the city Council, administration and clergy alike to do what we can to put a stop to this. To get to the parent to let them know that there are individuals out there that will help them with a child that they can't control. To let the grandparents know that there are programs and there are individuals out there that can help them if they've found themselves over, over ran by the children which they are raising. These are our kids. They are the future and it becomes a cliché, but one of the reasons I ran as I laid in bed thinking about my one year old and I thought who's he going to play with? Cause as I look out and I, and I see some of the behaviors that are being expressed it just; I'm 30 years old and it seems like times have changed drastically. Our kids aren't doing Dennis the Menace things as much anymore. They're going to jail. They're picking up guns and they're robbing. They're making mistakes early in life that they can't fix that will haunt them for the rest of their lives as they try to become successful adults. And so I hope that with individuals coming and speaking to us there's some of us here at Council, the administration specially the clergy also that we can get together on the same page whether it's a public forum or, or whatever the ideas are that are out there. But we cannot continue to let this go and throw our children to the legal system. We have to try to intervene before this gets out of hand. Thank you.

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: Thank you Mr. Colbert and I would encourage that very theory that you have about a public forum and maybe we can get different segments of the community together to play a part in that. I would encourage you to even do that as Police and Fire Chairman that would be good.

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: Before we adjourn Miss Cicero I wanted to say to give Mr. Torres, Senior Torres, kudos, he went above and beyond and out of his way to answer a call for me in the evening which I thought was wonderful so it goes to show-

MRS. CICERO: (Replies without use of the microphone)

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: The other thing is I appreciate his and you know it's a credit to you that your area, I wanted to tell you that because a lot of people think I don't care about the city operations. I do and Chief I wanted to pass on to you.

I had a most enjoyable luncheon the other day with the Police Chief of Parma. I didn't know Parma had 84,000 people. I didn't know they had 90 Policemen. I thought Parma was a little small suburb of Cleveland, 12,000 people. Hell it's twice the size of us and he said something to the effect that you were a standup guy. So whatever that means, it was a credit to you and I think we all know that.

MRS. RUCKER: Thank you. Don't forget to attend the parade also and enjoy your holiday and be safe. Council will retire to Wings on Mahoning Avenue. Move to adjourn.
