**PIERSON BUTCHER, JR., 1194 ADELAIDE SE, WARREN, OHIO:** Pierson Butch Butcher, 1194 Adelaide SE, Warren, Ohio 44484. I got the chance to go to the northwest meeting over at Red Cross and it was great and I think all of us here should attend the meeting that they all have over at the Pamela Apartments this month, the 17<sup>th</sup> at 11 o'clock. I think it's good for us all to be there. It shows our strength; you get strength in numbers.

Also Councilman Colbert caught me mowing the yard up on the northwest side. The guy that I was mowing the yard for was the type of guy, well why should I fix this up? I'm up here on the northwest. I'm mowing his yard. I did some things for him. Now, he's going to start painting his roof, fixing up the front of his building cause it's coming in to town. It's right down from Larry's Pawn; Southern Blvd. and West Market. So that's a start.

**REMARKS**

MAYOR O'BRIEN: Thank you Mr. President, Members of Council: For those Members of Council that were here last year this originated with a 15-minute conversation with the sheriff a year and a half ago, well probably 8, 19months ago regarding assistance from the county to the city to modify the jail contract; also met with county commissioners along with the sheriff. Two months ago had a conversation with County Auditor Adrian Biviano and that with County Auditor Biviano, Commissioner Fuda, Commissioner Polivka, Commissioner Heltzel and again they were in agreement unanimously to modify the contract or keep the same contract in tact. This results in a 211,000 savings, so you know 422,000 savings in two years from the original contract so I think it's very generous of the county commissioners and the county

auditor to give us that discount for the jail operations. Thank you Mr. President.

REMARKS

MR. NOVAK: Thank you Mr. President. I'm sure everyone realizes how important this transfer and appropriation ordinance is with being able to bring back two officers with what we had offered to us especially with the ongoing VGRIP and what the task force is going that we can have additional participation. Also too, we will have some money available to do some grass cutting to try to get caught up. We can't depend totally on the inmates to try to keep up with the thousands of empty lots and bankruptcy houses that we have. But I would hope that after we get our 3<sup>rd</sup> quarter report that we can scutinize the budget and I would hope and pray and we can next look at bringing back some firemen to get our outlying stations open even if it's on an alternative basis. But that must be our goal next is bringing some firemen back, it's sorely needed also. Thank you Mr. President.

MS. RUCKER: Thank you Mr. President. I'm not supporting this legislation not because I don't believe that we should not bring police officers back. I feel as strong as all of you do that we should be bringing police officers back when we can. However, I'm not supporting us gauging another department. We all saw what happened with the Water and the Wastewater Department when we did that and this robbing 'peter to pay paul' method just to me needs to stop. It puts the job security of all our employees in jeopardy. Now, when the question was asked how will we pay these officers and these employees coming back in January, which is only five months from now, no answer was given and I thought that should have happened. Now the truck that's slatted to buy and the studies that we're voting for tonight and even the grass cutting was met with long discussion and planning. But this subject wasn't and so to ask officers; I remember the emotion before this started, to me this is how we got in trouble in the first place when we said, don't hire police and fire and we did it anyway and then we got in trouble. And it seems to me like we're going it all over again and so while I am opposing this, I feel that we should stick to our

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budget and wait these next five months and see where we stand in January to bring our people back to work so that they can stay at work; and not put their lives and their families in jeopardy by putting them in the position that they may be facing another layoff. That's just my opinion and that's why I'm not supporting this. Thank you Mr. President.

MR. NOVAK

Thank you Mr. President. I would just like to thank all of our neighborhood groups and all of those folks again that make an effort that go next door or across the street and cut that lawn at that foreclosure house or weed-whack the weeds or pick up trash. Again, as I said before a lot of the people don't realize how many folks there are that do that and don't ask for anything for it or are never recognized. But it's important and I think it is wonderful with our groups the way they've grown and they're out and doing this. It's hard to get people to work for free, but I think its self-satisfaction and it's pride in your city that you do that. So if anybody needs any experience doing that, get ahold of those groups or give me a call in the morning. My one son and I will be out in the morning trying to beat the rain on Friday. So, thank you Mr. President.

DIRECTOR FRANKLIN: Thank you Mr. President. I just wanted to piggyback on what Councilman Novak was just talking about, because the Mayor didn't have a report it threw me off. I'd also like to thank the Northwest Neighborhood Association for the favor they did regarding the Cal Ripken Tournament. We knew we were going to have a lot of out of town guests in town and they sort of helped with patrolling the neighborhood and make sure no car vandalism took place. So I thank them personally but I wanted to thank them on the record. We really appreciate all that you're doing. Thank you Mr. President.

MAYOR O'BRIEN: Thank you Mr. President. Because I get pressure from Law Director Hicks I don't give report, but anyway as the Director has mentioned, I too, want to offer my sincere thanks to the Northwest Neighborhood Association for the diligence at the Cal Ripken Tournament. The organizer of the Cal Ripken Tournament reported to me that throughout the weekend your very vigilant and throughout the whole tournament in the park, outside the park and it was very much appreciated by the organizers as well as people from out of town, from the Columbus area, Fairfield area and Dayton area. We were fortunate, the, it was a very successful Cal Ripken Tournament. The state officials were very impressed and they were very impressed with your work and your efforts with the neighborhood association. So again, thank you very much and we'll be there Saturday.

MR. BROWN

Thank you Mr. President. I would just like thank Director Franklin and manager Cicero for putting the dumpster up at the corner again on Genesee. (inaudible) and probably one or two more dumpster lots and we'll have all that, the tree limbs and trash out of there, appreciate that. Thank you.

MS. MORN

Thank you Mr. President. I'd like to extend on the grass cutting. I'd really like to thank Mr. Butcher, he's really been a God-send to the 4<sup>th</sup> Ward. Thank you doesn't seem enough. He has done so much and unfortunately now I've got to share him with the rest of the city. He's done a phenomenal job in my ward. Thank you Mr. Butcher.

MR. FLASK

Thank you Mr. President. First I would just like to welcome the all season thrift store on to Youngstown Road in the 5<sup>th</sup> Ward; one more vacant building filled. And along with the Northwest Neighborhood Association for the work they did with the tournament. We need to commend the organizers of the tournament themselves and the city employees and all of the work that they've done. I was there for one of the games between Warren and Fairfield. Fairfield had absolutely nothing but wonderful things to say about the City of Warren and how they were treated and were extremely impressed with this. It needs to

be said that this was a vision, the youth tournament and the youth organization combining if everybody recalls just a few years ago there was there leagues in this city being McKinley, the Warren City League and Burbank. And they have all combined and it has been nothing but fantastic I believe for those children and for everybody involved. So thank you to the operations and anybody else in the city that had any involvement with that. Thank you.

MS. SAFFOLD

Thank you Mr. President. Speaking of grass cutting, Mr. Butcher you are more than welcome in the 6<sup>th</sup> Ward anytime you'd like to come over. The 6<sup>th</sup> Ward held it's monthly ward meeting June 22<sup>nd</sup> at Second Baptist Church and there were roughly 60 residents or so Warren residents in attendance and the topic was 'Does Warren need a Charter Government?' I believe that it was very successful. The residents asked a lot of pertinent questions to Mr. Dan Crouse who was there to address the issue. So I would like to thank my ward, I have a couple here in attendance who were there. Thank you very much. We appreciate you helping us out there.

Also I would like to make the administration and Mr. Pinti aware of the fact that the houses that have been demolished in my ward, there has been no cleanup in most of those instances. When you ride past those houses that have been torn down what you see is a large crater with all types of debris and garbage out there. So I don't know if you all were aware of that or not. Thank you Mr. President.

MR. COLBERT

Thank you Mr. President. With the 7<sup>th</sup> Ward had a meeting also in regard to the upcoming vote we have on charter. I'd also like to thank Mr. Crouse, Mr. Nuzzi, as well as representative from our ward that represented us on the ad hoc committee Miss Shirley Brady for coming and answering some of the questions from the constituents. The only things I ask is that we continue to stay involved as a citizenry; stay involved in this and stay informed on what we're doing going forward.

A report from the neighborhood liaison committee. I don't think we got to talk about it on June 26<sup>th</sup> we did a, there was a neighborhood cleanup done on Warren Boulevard there and I think it was very successful and as Mr. Butcher has stated. But the one thing that I'd like to state from that is that in that cleanup not only did we have members from all over the city, but we had representatives from groups, from the neighborhood groups from all four corners of the city. This was not something of just one side of the town working on one side of the town. Four to five neighborhood groups that stretch across this city from the northeast, west and the south side all came together to do this project and I just want to commend them for their efforts and hope that they can continue those efforts in the future. Thank you Mr. President.

MS. RUCKER

Thank you Mr. President. Yesterday Mr. Pinti said something in the meeting that has just stayed on my mind when we were talking about the grass cutting and he was saying that about the citizen involvement and citizens cutting grass was such crucial part, and I'd just like to throw this idea out to Council Members and the administration that can we think about some type of way or some incentive or recognition of these citizens who do this. We do mention their names here on council, but I think we can do a little bit more, like maybe part of our beautification program, bring that back or something. So kind of think of what we could do. Thank you Mr. President.

MR. DEAN

Thank you Mr. President. I was thinking earlier this week of the time that Council Member Barkley was here. He got to be one of my better friends but privately he would tell me often that there were some things that I was passionate about and sometimes you didn't know if it was constructive criticism or just plain criticism. And he finally said it one day sitting over there in public and the two at large Council Members beside me at that time were Council Member Fonce and Council Member Romain and kind of out of the corner of their eye they kind of gave me that look like 'are you going to take that?' and I said to myself you know I am passionate about what he's talking about. I'm

passionate about the military. I'm passionate about veterans. I'm passionate about Warren, Ohio.

Not too long ago Paul Warfield the Hall of Famer was at the A. Phillip Randolph Banquet and Doug will tell you he told a number of baseball stories. One of the stories he reminded us of, he and I were both sixteen playing for the American Legion and we made the Ohio All-Star Team and our first game was down in Louisville and yeah we were from Warren, Ohio so the rest of the big time, Cincinnati, Columbus, Toledo, big time guys; they kind of treated us like we were from the country. So when they were announced. They announced their position, their name, where they were in the batting order. These guys bragged about their average, so that's what they put on their lineup card. When it came my turn I put Warren, Ohio at the end of it and Paul wrote Warren, Ohio, and we could see the giggling down at the end of the bench. Paul led off that game with a line drive that cleared a 4-10 center field fence by about 30 feet and I came behind him and just made it over the left field wall inside the flagpole. The score was 2 to 0 in the 5<sup>th</sup> inning when Paul got on and he smoked one right over the right field fence and right behind him again over left field fence. That score was 4-0 and when we picked up our gear Paul had to through a grin on his face and he said when we get to Knoxville, they won't be laughing. When we got to Knoxville all fifteen ball players inserted the name of their town in the batting order.

Now I say that because as the Tribune had once described it in the airways someone said that people were laughing at us. Someone said here in this chambers that people were laughing at us. Now I want to tell you, I get about a little bit. I'm a member of a number of boards; a number of activities. I'm on the board of Main Street. I'm on the board of the African-American Achievers. I'm a member of the Jefferson Club. I'm a member of the Robert Deliberating Club. I'm a member of the VFW. I'm a member of the American Legion. Now just in the last few weeks or so I've attended a number of churches; Grace AME, New Jerusalem, Grace Fellowship, St. James, North Mar, Agathe, just to name a few and I do that because one of the things I guess is a chance to get feedback and the Mayor will tell you every Sunday morning I sit with a group of guys; two are doctors; one's a lawyer; one guy's a retired GM worker; a couple of them own property in this city; a lot of feedback every Sunday morning. Every Wednesday morning I deliver Meals On Wheels. If you want unfiltered feedback deliver Meals On Wheels to people who don't have a whole lot of people to talk to. Now I have an ear for laughter. My office was on the 17<sup>th</sup> floor in a building right in the heart of the City of Cleveland. So I hear a lot about the river that was on fire. Now I can tell you nobody was laughing when one of our police officers and Doug Franklin and I were watching receive the key to the city from Youngstown. Nobody was laughing when the governor of this state passed a gavel to me as chair of the largest nursing home in the country; 512 members at Sandusky, 300 at Mt. Cora. Nobody was laughing when the President of the United States hugged Doug Franklin's children in the White House passing on his awards.

DIRECTOR FRANKLIN: Doug Hipple's.

MR. DEAN: Doug Hipple's, I'm sorry.

DIRECTOR FRANKLIN: My children are too big.

MR. DEAN: I would also say to those who don't fully understand the change of command as it flows in the Police Department. The chain flows from the most junior officer in the Police Department up to Doug Franklin. It also flows from Doug Franklin down to the most junior officer in the Police Department. I've yet to hear anybody in this city laughing at Doug Franklin. I think Doug Franklin is one of the most respected officials in this city if not the most in this city. So I would hear that anyone who hears this silly outburst and some kind of laughter at our city or our people, or our Police Department or our

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Safety-Service Director. Tell them the story about Paul Warfield and remind them what happened to those who had no reason to laugh. Thank you.

MR. DIPPOLITO

Thank you Mr. President. I'll just restate a few comments I made yesterday at the Finance meeting dealing with suggesting that the administration maybe take a drive down Dunstan and the lower end coming from Tod Avenue that's the area where the exit to the new school is and that sidewalk on the right hand side is practically covered, you can't even see the sidewalk. There's people walking or parking there which I think will become a problem if we have our students running up and down and I'm sure the neighbors in the area are going to be unhappy if they can't park. They've been doing it for a number of years. I think it, make sure somebody in the Health Department, Police official or somebody of that nature and I'm sure they'll see what I'm talking about and probably do something with it, appreciate it. Thank you Mr. President.

PRESIDENT MARCHESE: Thank you Mr. Dippolito and I'm sure the Director will solve it. Before we adjourn we want to say 'hi' to our State Representative Mr. Tom Letson, Tom thank you for coming.
